

Launching a
NEW
SEASON



“But forget all that— it is nothing compared to what I am going to do. For I am about to do something new. See, I have already begun! Do you not see it? I will make a pathway through the wilderness. I will create rivers in the dry wasteland.” Isaiah 43:18-19

God is always doing something new but sometimes we miss it because we're either stuck in the past and unable to see what He's doing or we're waiting for a dramatic event to trigger the new. Meanwhile as far as God is concerned the clock is already ticking on the new.

This season we're digging into how to launch the new season God has already created for us. We trust that the Holy Spirit will guide us through this series and give each of us a personal revelation of how to activate the new.



Day 1: See Beyond the Past

“And no one, having drunk old wine, immediately desires new; for he says, ‘The old is better.’” Luke 5:39

The first step to launching into the new is being willing to let go of the past because it is often one of the biggest hindrances to the new. Most of us are by nature comfortable with the familiar: whether it's good or bad. There's a sense of familiarity that can keep us staying in one place even though there are several options before us. And if we're honest with ourselves, while the idea of new sounds exciting, we typically prefer the new to be a version that looks like what we already know and have some experience in. So in launching into the new it helps to recognise this and keep ourselves open to some level of disruption.

“Brethren, I do not count myself to have apprehended; but one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forward to those things which are ahead, I press toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus.” Philippians 3:13-14

Letting go of the old doesn't mean the past is irrelevant, rather its recognition that the past cannot compete with what God is doing now. We need grace to intentionally disconnect from former wins, past disappointments, or familiar patterns so we don't miss divine movement. As Paul said there's a pressing forward required on our past where we intentionally set certain things aside.

“But forget all that...” Isaiah 43:18

While we may want to run away from past negativity, it's not easy to disconnect from past wins- things we celebrated and were celebrated for. Yet Paul shows us the one of the keys to launching into the new is to intentionally forget the past. It doesn't mean we're wiping the experiences away from our memories, rather we're taking the learnings and laying them before Jesus so they don't have a hold over us. By doing this we're telling Him that we're grateful for the past and trusting Him for the future.

The instruction to forget is an invitation to shift focus. Clinging to what was dulls our sensitivity to what is unfolding and expecting repetition can make us miss revelation.

Prayer: Lord I ask that You recalibrate my vision. Show me what I'm holding onto that is blinding me to what You have already begun.



Day 2: It Starts With A Shift

“For I am about to do something new. See, I have already begun! Do you not see it?...”
Isaiah 43:19

By the time God announces something He’s already set things in motion to accomplish the fulfilment of what He’s said. When the Lord told Isaiah, “See, I have already begun”, He was giving us an important insight into how He operates. God is always ready to do something new, but He can only move to the extent that we see what He’s doing so we can align and run with it.

“Trust in the Lord with all your heart, And lean not on your own understanding...Do not be wise in your own eyes...” Proverbs 3:5, 7

Which leads to His critical question: “Do you not see it?” God understands us and He knows that it’s very possible for Him to be actively operating in our lives yet we won’t even perceive it. The challenge with perception is that it’s based on spiritual awareness rather than natural evidence and this causes conflict because there’s a tendency to place more emphasis on the seen than unseen. But God doesn’t work that way and it’s our spiritual awareness that helps us discern the subtle shifts that occur when God has initiated something new.

“...we fix our gaze on things that cannot be seen. For the things we see now will soon be gone, but the things we cannot see will last forever.” 2 Corinthians 4:18

“...the things which are seen were not made of things which are visible.” Hebrews 11:3

It’s possible for us to be waiting for God to do something dramatic meanwhile He’s already started with quiet shifts - new ideas, new alignments, new instructions - and He’s waiting for us to respond in obedience. When we discern what God is doing early, we can align quickly and receive the instructions needed to establish the new. One of the questions we must always ask God for is spiritual intelligence by opening our eyes to see where He has already started something that we’ve overlooked.

Prayer: Lord open my eyes to the shifts You’ve already started in my life. Help me not to put my trust in what I see, but in You because I know You’re the one who changes things behind the scenes. Give me heightened sensitivity to perceive and align early with the shifts



Day 3: Pathway Through The Wilderness

“I will make a pathway through the wilderness...” Isa 43:19

“So God led them... through the wilderness toward the Red Sea...” Exodus 13:18

Sometimes the new season leads us through a wilderness—not to frustrate us, but to refine us. There is a transformation that can only happen in the wilderness, and it is that refined version of us that is required for what lies ahead.

When Pharaoh released the Israelites, God intentionally did not lead them through the shortest route. Though quicker, it would have exposed them to war they were not prepared for. Having lived as slaves for generations, they lacked the capacity for battle. In His wisdom and love, God chose a longer path to prepare them for what was coming.

“Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit...was led by the Spirit into the wilderness,” Luke 4:1

“Jesus returned...in the power of the Spirit...” Luke 4:14

Even Jesus did not step into His assignment immediately. Though filled with the Holy Spirit, He was first led into the wilderness. It was after this season—marked by discipline, testing, and victory—that He emerged in power.

If we cooperate with God, wilderness seasons become places of preparation, not delay. In these seasons, we gain the skills, capacity, relationships, and spiritual depth required for the new. God refines our character, disciplines, and desires so we are not overwhelmed by what is ahead.

God does not eliminate the wilderness—He transforms it into a pathway. What feels unfamiliar and uncomfortable is often His intentional route to lead us into what He has already prepared.

Are you in a wilderness season? Ask for wisdom to navigate it and trust Him, even when the path is unclear.

Prayer: Lord help me to navigate the unfamiliar and uncomfortable seasons of my journey. I trust You to lead me even when I don't understand, and I receive grace to walk in obedience, knowing You are preparing me for more.



Day 4: Activate The New

“Enlarge your house; build an addition. Spread out your home, and spare no expense! For you will soon be bursting at the seams. Your descendants will occupy other nations and resettle the ruined cities.” Isaiah 54:2-3

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God has already initiated the new, but there is a role we play in stepping into it. One of the ways to launch into a new season is to prepare for what you’re praying for. Preparation sends a signal both to yourself and the spirit realm that you are ready to step into the new.

Preparation can be prompted by a direct instruction from God or a sensing that it’s time to do something different. God does this because He always speaks the new before it is visible and this calls for us to act in faith ahead of manifestation. Especially if the steps we plan to take don’t seem to make logical sense at the time.

Activating the new means to intentionally create capacity for what we’re expecting.

Many times we pray for a new season, yet maintain structures, habits, and thinking patterns that keep us in our current state. God’s word challenges us to stretch—spiritually, mentally, and practically.

When God gives an instruction to build, spread out and a spare no expense He’s not speaking in passive language. He’s challenging us to be strategic and deliberate. He’s showing us that activating the new requires investment of time, discipline, resources, and obedience. He deliberately stretches us out of our comfort zone to position us for what is coming.

“Lead me in the right path, O Lord... Make your way plain for me to follow.” Psalms 5:8

As exciting as the prospect of launching into the new is, it can be difficult knowing what to do especially when we’re moving along a path we haven’t taken before. The best way to prepare is to ask God to show us the areas of our life we need to start making adjustments in- it could be it our thinking, skills, network, spiritual discipline. We need the help of the Holy Spirit for clarity and strength to begin to build accordingly.

Prayer: Lord open my eyes to see where and how I need to grow to activate the new. Give me the courage to take the steps needed even if I don’t see the full picture. Open my ears to hear Your instructions and a trusting heart to obey fully.

Day 5: Expect Supernatural Supply

“...I will even make...rivers in the desert.” Isaiah 43:19

When God speaks of rivers in the desert, He is revealing His ability to create supernatural abundance in places that once represented lack, limitation, delay, or exhaustion. What looked barren is not beyond Him, He transforms it into a place of flow and supply.

“And God is able to make all grace abound toward you, that you, always having all sufficiency in all things, may have an abundance for every good work.” 2 Corinthians 9:8

God doesn't just reverse dry conditions; He turns them into channels of overflow. His intention is that we live in sufficiency through Him—never empty, never stranded—always resourced for every assignment He has given us. When we understand Him as our source, we shift from striving to trusting as we recognise that from Him alone comes a supernatural supply of ideas, resources, relationships, and opportunities that are aligned with our purpose.

We were never designed to rely on human effort alone. When we yield to the Holy Spirit, He guides us into alignment with heaven's unlimited supply. What we could not manufacture in our strength, He releases through grace. Notice that God promises rivers—not just a river, speaking of continuity, not scarcity. There are two types of supply we may encounter in a desert: human-engineered and divine. Human systems can create temporary provision, but when we depend on people as our source, we become subject to their limitations leading to striving, pressure, and unnecessary dependence. But scripture reveals a higher system.

“He shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, That brings forth its fruit in its season, Whose leaf also shall not wither; and whatever he does shall prosper.” Psalms 1:3

This divine flow sustains us, ensuring that we produce the right results in every season. It keeps us fruitful, relevant, and anchored in God's provision. These rivers are sustained by His wisdom and activated through obedience.

Prayer: Lord where I have experienced lack, I receive Your supernatural provision. I step away from striving and ask for divine strategies to remain rooted in Your supply, now and always.



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
